Old Louisville garden tour, related events set

The Second Street Neighborhood Association is holding its 16th annual garden tour, dubbed "Hidden Treasures," this month.

The tour, scheduled for Saturday, July 11, and Sunday, July 12, will include gardens in the Garvin Gate, Central Park and St. James Park areas of the Old Louisville Historic Preservation District, according to a news release.

The tours will run from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day, and the cost is \$15 the day of the event or \$12 in advance. Proceeds will fund the Second Street Neighborhood Association's efforts throughout the Old Louisville Historic Preservation District.

The walking tour will feature 10 gardens and a coach house. Highlights of this year's garden tour feature examples of container gardening, a variety of water features, an Asian-themed garden, a fern garden, a cottage garden incorporating flower and vegetable beds and a garden designed to be totally edible, the release said.

The tour includes the seventh annual "Art in the Garden" event, sponsored by The DuPont Mansion bed and breakfast, 1317 S. Fourth St. Art in the Garden features local artists painting in The DuPont Mansion from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. both days.

The 2009 Art in the Garden poster artist is Donna Chancellor, and 50 copies of the limited-edition 2009 Art in the Garden poster signed and numbered by the artist will be for sale during the event.

In a related event, owners of the Pink Palace home on St. James will host a Garden Tour Preview Gala on Friday, July 10. The wine and cheese party will include live music to benefit the Conrad-Caldwell House Museum.
